#### **Dates in** History

- On December 2nd, physicist Enrico Fermi 1942 produced the first nuclear chain reaction. He built a jury-rigged laboratory with the necessary equipment, which he called an "atomic pile," in a squash court in the basement of Stagg Field at the University of Chicago. With colleagues and other physicists looking on, Fermi produced the first selfsustaining nuclear chain reaction and the "new world" of nuclear power was born.
- On December 17th, Hollywood stuntman 1979 Stan Barrett blasted across a dry lakebed at California's Edwards Air Force Base in a rocket and missile powered car, becoming the first man to travel faster than the speed of sound on land. He did not set an official record, however. The radar scanner was malfunctioning, and so Barrett's top speed, 739.666 miles per hour by the most reliable measure, was only an estimate. Also, he only drove his rocket car across the lakebed once. not twice as official record guidelines require. It took until October 1997 for another driver, in a British car called the Thrust SSC, to officially break the Mach 1 sound barrier.
- On December 31st, the Chicago Bears 1988 defeated the Philadelphia Eagles, 20-12, in a playoff game plagued by a thick fog that started late in the first half. Playing conditions at Soldier Field in Chicago became problematic, and fans in attendance and television viewers struggled to see the game, dubbed the "Fog Bowl" by media. The freak conditions were caused when cold air over Lake Michigan was blown by a breeze toward warm air at Soldier Field on the lakefront, according to the National Weather Service. Meteorologists said the fog was so thick that it was like having clouds on the ground.
