Dates in History

- **1582** When Pope Gregory XIII introduced his Gregorian calendar, Europe adhered to the Julian calendar, first implemented by Julius Caesar in 46 B.C. Since the Roman emperor's system miscalculated the length of the solar year by 11 minutes, the calendar had since fallen out of sync with the seasons. This concerned Gregory because it meant that Easter, traditionally observed on March 21, fell further away from the spring equinox with each passing year.
- 1606 King James I chartered the joint stock company, Virginia Company of London, to establish a colony in North America, sending three ships containing 144 men and boys to America on December 20th. Five months later, these first settlers selected Jamestown Island as the place to build a fort.
- 1792 Ludwig van Beethoven paid Austrian composer Joseph Haydn \$0.19 for his first music lesson December 12. M. Solomon later noted in a biography "Beethoven unfailingly referred to his old master in terms of reverence, regarding him as the equal" of Mozart and Bach."
- **1867** The National Grange of the Order of Patrons of Husbandry, "a fraternal organization in the United States encouraging families to band together to promote the economic and political well-being of the community and agriculture" was founded December 4th. On the heels of the Civil War, and spurred by outdated southern farming practices, it organized people from the North and South together in a spirit of mutual cooperation.
- **1966** Dr. Seuss' book, "How the Grinch Stole Christmas," was made into an animated TV special and shown for first time on CBS.
